- 1. A high sand dune named Snake Hill existed at this location until the late 1800's. It was directly above this park where Lakeshore Road is now and extended for several blocks.
- 2. The area to the west of Snake Hill was known as Snake Hill Grove,in the period after the War of 1812 until the 1880's, and was used as a picnic area.
- 3. During the War of 1812, The Park area was occupied by the United States Army in the summer of 1814, as part of the grounds of Fort Erie (British military post). They fortified the area with a battery of 6 cannons on top of the sand dune, named Towson's Battery, and regiments of troops on the ground.
- 3. On the night of Aguust 14-15, 1814, the battery on top of Snake Hill was attacked by about 1500 British troops as part of a 3 pronged assault on the Fort in order to recapture the position. There was a major battle here. One group approached through the water, having rounded an abbatis, and landed on the beach at the bottom of this Park. Many British soldiers were killed or wounded in the attack on Snake HIII.

Missing-1 dept.-assist.-quartermaster-general, 1 captain, 3 lieuts., 2 ensigns, 1 midshipman, 1 adjutant, 7 seamen, 41 sergeants, 3 drummers, 479 rank and file. Of the number returned missing the greater part are supposed to have been killed by the explosion of a magazine.

Willcox, the next senior officer of the brigade, will take command until his arrival. Gen'l. Porter entrusts the command to either of these gentlemen with great confidence, and is confident that their orders will be promptly obeyed.

Brigade-Major Fraser will accompany General Porter, and during his absence Adjutant Dobbin will perform the duties of his

office.

The high character which the volunteers have established throughout the country by their orderly and gallant conduct, he trusts will be maintained during his absence.

Maj. Wood will command the Pennsylvania and Major

Matteson the New York Volunteers.


FORT ERIE, August 15th, 1814.

Sir.—In obedience to your instructions, I have the honor to report the gallant conduct of my command during the attack which

took place on the night of the 14th instant.

I cannot do greater justice to the troops which I had the honor to command on that occasion than to state that the 21st Infantry, together with a small detachment of the 11th under Captain Chunn, in all about three hundred men, aided by the skill and activity of that distinguished officer, Captain Towson of the Artillery, who commanded the battery on Snake Hill, met and repulsed five impetuous charges given by Colonel Fisher at the head of fourteen hundred British regulars. These troops were formed in columns of attack, and stormed without flints in their muskets. Our lines were completely manned, and everything ready to receive the enemy when he approached. And perhaps a more signal example of firmness and steady valor was seldom, if ever, given by the veterans of Europe. Finding himself repulsed at all points with great slaughter, Colonel Fisher saw fit to retire with his shattered columns at dawn of day.

For the happy result which crowned our arms at this particular point I am under great obligations to Captains Marston and Ropes, the former of whom commanded on the left, and the latter commanded the corps of reserves which repulsed the enemy at the edge




